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INTRODUCTION

And it shall come to pass afterward that I will pour out My Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions. And also on My menservants and My maidservants I will pour out My Spirit in those days. (Joel 2:28–29)

THE WORLD CHANGED THE DAY the Holy Spirit fell on Jesus' remaining disciples in that famed upper room in Jerusalem. The Spirit of God, reserved in the Old Testament for a select few, had now been placed on anyone who sought and loved Christ. With that outpouring came the gifts of the Spirit. While once only a few could prophesy, suddenly everyone could.

I have been in the prophetic ministry since 1974. I began prophesying the year before. That's more than thirty years of sharing the love God has placed in my heart. Amazingly, I'm still learning—and I never want to stop. Every year, I understand something new about God and His ways. He never ceases to intrigue me.

More than a decade ago, my book *Developing Your Prophetic Gifting*, was first published. It has been a greater success than I could have ever imagined. It has gone through many reprintings; several publishers have taken it up; it has been written in many, many languages; and it still is on the best-seller list; and yet the material I teach now is light years beyond that original manuscript. I have come a long way in the years since I wrote that first book. For one thing, I have taught countless prophetic schools during that time. As I work with students and emerging prophetic voices, I have had my own gift shaped and honed.

"As iron sharpens iron, so a man sharpens the countenance of his friend," as it says in Proverbs 27:17. The people I have met have pushed me further into the things of the prophetic. They have challenged me to find fresh ways of equipping, explaining, and encouraging.

For several months, I have felt the Lord prompt me to rewrite *Developing Your Prophetic Gifting*, adding the material I have taught in my schools over the past ten years since it was published. This book is the first in a series of six that will more fully equip people longing to speak the words of God to those around them.

Following the unqualified success of the spirituality journals in the Being with God Series, I have decided to develop this material into the same format.

Each book has assignments, exercises, and meditations that, if followed, will bring each individual into an experience of God within the context of the material.

Together, we will study the practical elements of hearing God, of

moving in the Spirit, of knowing God's nature, and of representing His heart to someone else. We will learn how to be grounded in the love, grace, and rhythm of God. It is my prayer that these books will give you something fresh about who God wants to

be for you. As you read the principles and illustrations within, I pray that you will be excited and inspired to venture further into what God has for you.

Prophecy comes when we have a burden to encourage and bless the people around us. There is no magic formula to prophesying; it all depends on our love for God. When we love Him fully, that love should

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spill over onto the people around us. Prophecy is simply encouraging, exhorting, and comforting people by tuning them into what God has for them. In every church in the world, there are people who need that life-giving word from God. These aren't just the individuals who are obviously struggling; some appear to have everything together. But God knows what's really going on.

Everyone could benefit from a prophetic word, even those for whom everything is soaring. I love to prophesy over people who are doing really well. If we can target those people and increase their faith at a critical time, they can fly even higher in the things of the Spirit.

New Testament prophecy will be spoken through the context of the gospel of grace. Jesus has received the judgment of God for sin for all those who are living, to enable them to find repentance through the goodness and kindness of God.

Prophecy is now in the context of a family, a company of calledout people who are learning together to become the beloved of God, the Bride of Christ. There is a new language in the Spirit to learn and the unity of the Spirit to maintain and enjoy, as a people together.

Of course there are necessary tensions in all good relationships and prophecy is not the way to resolve conflicts. Clearly we need wisdom for those situations.

I believe strongly that the more encouraging, exhorting, and comforting prophecy we have, the better our churches will be. Blessing and encouragement stir up anointing. The more of this kind of prophecy we can have in church, the less we will need intensive, time-consuming pastoral care. People will actually be touched by God and come into the things of the Spirit themselves. Individuals will realize that, yes, they are loved personally by God. That kind of revelation will stoke their faith in ways a counseling session never could.

I know I need that kind of encouragement every day from the Holy Spirit. I can't remember the last time I asked Him to encourage me and He didn't. He may not speak it out immediately, but He always meets me at the point of my greatest need. That's just who the Holy Spirit is and what He loves to do.

This book can help you go further in the prophetic than you have ever hoped. After all, "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him" (I Corinthians 2:9).

The Process of Prophecy is not a quick read. I encourage you to take your time going through this book, reading slowly and with your heart, until you understand the themes and thoughts they contain.

Furthermore, don't neglect the exercises, case studies, and Bible readings included at the end of each volume—they are valuable practice tools that will take the lessons taught and put them into practice in your life.

Throughout this book, I have included several sidebar articles about some of my prophetic heroes. These are people who lived after the Bible was finished being written, heard the voice of God for themselves, and did marvelous exploits for the Kingdom. I hope this will open your eyes to a few of the people who have gone before us.

I have also included some suggestions of resources that may help you further explore the themes contained in this book. I hope they prompt you to dig deeper into the things of the Spirit.

F PROPHECY, LIKE A WEBSITE, had a list of frequently asked questions, this one would top it: "When I'm moving in prophecy, how can I tell if it's me, the Lord, or the enemy?" I've been asked that question many hundreds of times over my thirty years in prophetic ministry.

It is a legitimate question. We are human beings, subject to pain, disillusionment, hurts, dreams, aspirations, longings, and desires. We sort, delete, distort, and repackage the mound of information we receive every day. Our humanity can conspire against us and color a prophetic word with a different hue than God intended. We can give into the power of "me."

We can also come under the influence of the enemy, either directly through bitter, unresolved issues in our lives, or indirectly through bad attitudes and a lack of good relationships. It is possible for a frustrated person to speak prophetically their own thoughts and opinions, mixing them with the words that God is really saying. The enemy can inspire that to happen and people could be moved by a spirit other than the Lord's, but this usually happens only when people have buried their hurts and rejection in real anger. Their lives become fertile ground for enemy activity. Alternatively, the enemy can use our unyielded thoughts

and impulses, and as we speak out of our own soul, he can move in behind our words to cause mischief.

With these issues in mind, it is no wonder so many Christians fear polluting a prophetic word. How do we give a pure word of prophecy that glorifies the Lord, has no tinge from our hearts, and has no influence of the enemy attached? Further complicating this question is the issue of faith. Sometimes we may not be operating in complete certainty and we have to prophesy as far as our faith allows.

One thing can guarantee the purity of our prophecy—a large dose of humility. A humble spirit ensures that we will not seek to do anything to dishonor the Lord Jesus, discredit the ministry, or disrupt the body of Christ.

In this life, we either humble ourselves or we get humiliated. We either fall on the rock or it falls on us. Humility is not a natural characteristic in any of us. No one is born with it. Our relationship with God builds as we submit our lives, thoughts, and perspectives to Him. Our aim is to always live our lives in the best way possible, so that the Holy Spirit is made welcome in us. "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me," as David sang in Psalm 51:10–11. "Do not cast me away from Your presence, and do not take Your Holy Spirit from me."

If we prophesy in humility and make a mistake, the Lord will give us grace to face the issue and put things right. Mistakes are inevitable as we learn how to move in the supernatural. That is why Paul was so clear in I Thessalonians 5:19–21—"Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies. Test all things; hold fast what is good." We need to be able to sift and separate the good from the bad, the misguided, and the misinterpreted.

AIMEE SEMPLE McPHERSON

Lived: 1891 to 1944

Prophetic Synopsis: Born in rural Canada, Aimee accepted Christ at age seventeen in a revival meeting led by Robert Semple. Months later, she married Semple and traveled with him to China to spread the gospel there. Upon their arrival in Hong Kong, however, both contracted malaria. Aimee was a few months pregnant when Robert died.

Alone, terrified, sick, pregnant, and just nineteen, Aimee called out to God. "Morning after morning of the month that followed, I would wake up with a scream as my great loss swept over me," she said. "Then the Comforter would instantly spring up within me until I was filled with joy unspeakable, and my hot, dry eyes would flow with tears of love and blessing." Aimee eventually gave birth to a little girl, worked hard, and made enough money for the two to return to America.

After remarrying, God called Aimee to preach. For months, she wrestled with that call. She had another child and eventually had a nervous breakdown.

As she laid in her bed, not sure if she was going to live or die, Jesus appeared to her and said, "Go preach My Word." Aimee made excuses as to why she couldn't, but Jesus was adamant: "Do the work of an evangelist. The time is short; I am coming soon." The moment she accepted the call, God healed her.

Eventually, Aimee moved to Los Angeles and planted a church. She arrived in 1921 with just a tambourine and ten dollars, and opened a 5,300-seat church – debt-free – a year later. The walls of her church were lined with the crutches, wheelchairs, and canes of the people God healed. Her illustrated sermons were copied by Hollywood: she rode in on a motorcycle once, and hired dozens of animals on another occasion. During the Great Depression, she set up a food bank and free store, helping 1.5 million people.

Key Comment: "All I could do was say one word when I prayed: Jesus!"

With the help of the Holy Spirit, we must ensure that we live our lives in the best way possible. There must be no part of us that does not belong to Jesus. Our lifestyle must be full of rejoicing, meditation, prayer, healing, waiting on God, love, and expectation.

REJOICING ALWAYS

Rejoicing is a key ingredient in moving in the power and presence of God. Many Christians have been conditioned to think that they enter God's presence with prayer. But Scripture is clear that thankfulness is the door to His presence—"Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise. Be thankful to Him, and bless His name," says Psalm 100:4.

It is not a coincidence that rejoicing precedes prayer without ceas-

ing. Our stillness is dependent on our gratitude. Whatever happens, we must thank God for the set of circumstances we are in. I'm not saying that we must thank God for something horrible that has happened: Christians are not called to be masochists. However,

we can thank God that He is always with us.

Rejoicing in God gives us the opportunity to hear Him. When we enter His presence with thanksgiving, we open more of ourselves to His voice. "In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you," Paul wrote in I Thessalonians 5:18. When we want to know God's will for a situation, we begin by giving thanks.

Probably two-thirds of the rest of the world would change places with us in the West in a heartbeat, no matter how poor our lifestyle. To many, we are rich beyond their wildest dreams. Count your blessings; there are so many things to give thanks for. If we struggle with being grateful to God for what He has given us, chances are we will be ungracious to people in how we live our lives. It is disciplines like gratitude, thanksgiving, praise, and worship that keep the presence of God fresh and alive in our hearts.

This is a fundamental spiritual truth that can reshape and reignite our personal time with God. By entering His presence with praise, not petitions, we learn how to adore God. Our hearts become full of constant, continuous worship. We are people called to be happy in God; if we don't have joy in our relationship with Him, how can we expect anyone else to?

As a Christian, who would you rather be represented by: the most miserable individual on Earth, or the happiest person in the world? This is the very choice God faces! Nobody wants to be represented by someone who is glum and miserable. Adoration helps us remain happy in God.
